From theatre, to parent's night out, to sports and pools, families have every opportunity to get involved and experience the rich variety of activities The J has to offer.


"I wouldn't be able to workout if I didn't have a place to bring my kids to," Angela Crush said.

First Female Arabic Woman Anchors Israeli TV

he went from being a child in the center of the Middle East conflict, witnessing terror right before her eyes to being the first Arabic woman to sit behind an anchor desk in Israel and talk about it.

the first Arab news anchor on Hebrew-language Israeli tele-vision and she'll be discussing just what it means to her and Israel's Arab and Israeli populations as J Arts & Ideas presents: A Conversation with Lucy Aharish on Tuesday, June 28, at 7 p.m. at The J.

Aharish currently anchors the Evening Edition of i24news and serves as a morning anchor on a current-affairs show on Channel 2. The Ministerial Committee for Symbols and Ceremonies describes Aharish as a "trailblazing Muslim journalist, who brings a discourse of tolerance and interdenominational openness to Israel's public agenda." Her ability to bring this openness has landed her roles in Israeli films and propelled her into being an Israeli celebrity.

Noted for her fights against racism and promoting pluralism in Israeli society, Aharish was selected to light the torch that kicked off Israeli Independence Day in 2015. She'll be talking about living in the shadow of a terror attack and what it's like to be an Israeli-living-Arab in Israel.

"On Highway 1, I saw Arabs being taken off a van and made to face the wall, with rifles aimed at them. I felt that no human being deserves that. But it's also impossible to ignore what the Palestinians are doing," Aharish said. Born in 1981 in the southern Israe-

town of Dimona, Aharish grew up as the only Arab student at her school. Just months before she turned six-years-old, Aharish was injured by a Molotov cocktail thrown at her family's car in the Gaza Strip by Palestinian militants.

In this program, Aharish will talk about the importance of promoting peace and discuss challenges and opportunities that Israeli society is facing today.

Cultural Arts Director Slava Nelson said it is very important to make Aharish's program accessible to everyone. We want our entire community to hear first-hand what it means to be in the middle of the Arab and Israeli conflict. We want to make sure as many people as possible can come," Nelson said. Louisville is only one of three cities

Aharish is visiting on her U.S. tour.

Children, Senior Adults Celebrate Passover at Senior Seder

Dozens of seniors and children gathered around tables embellished in white linens, matzah and more in The J's Patio Gallery to celebrate Passover on Wednesday, April 20, during the 2016 Senior Model Seder.

Together, the children and senior adults dipped parsley in salt water and broke matzah as Cantor Sharon Hordes, of Keneseth Israel, explained the symbolism of each food item for Passover. Senior Adult Director Diane Sadle said that including children in the senior Seder each year reminds the seniors of the times when they celebrated with their children.

"The children add vitality to the program and they can participate because they're learning about it in school. Seniors love it because many of their family members don't live in town and it may be the only Seder they get to participate in all year," Sadle said.

Despite the mix of the children's higher-pitched voices with those of the more alto senior's, Hordes unified each voice in prayer, creating a beautiful celebration and feast. "Ok everyone, you're going to all recline in your seats and lean to the left when you eat the matzah," Hordes said.

The wide-eyed children giggled and reclined and one said, "Why are we doing this?"

"Why, because we are free people!" Hordes exclaimed. "Only free people had the luxury of reclining and eating back in ancient times."

While the seniors and children were all relaxing and eating, Sadle said, "It's rewarding to watch this isn't? To watch the seniors interact like this with the children?"

"It reminds them of their grandchildren or great-grandchildren who maybe don't live here," Sadle said. For some, it reminds them of their childhood.

The J has hosted the Senior Model Seder for more than 20 years, and in 2010, it was one senior's dying wish to ensure the program always happened. Judith Bensinger loved gathering at the inter-generational Seder each year. After her death, Bensinger's family decided to sponsor the program every year in her memory.

Sadle said The J wouldn't be able to host the program without the Bensingers' support.

ers' support. "It's so very important we continue this tradition. To bring our seniors the tradition they may not have at home anymore and to help them remember the good times," Sadle said.

The J's Holocaust Museum Trip Connects Students of Many Faiths

The United States, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iraq, Eritrea/Ethiopia, Rwanda and Cuba were countries represented when 20 students traveled with The J to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C., on Sunday, May 1.

For the past 20 years, The J has sent high schoolers to the Holocaust Museum to help them understand and connect with the lessons of the Holocaust. This year was unlike any other year before.

"This year, we brought some students from the Newcomer's Academy, meaning we are among the first people to help students from many different faiths and countries have an understanding of what the Holocaust is and how it impacted the Jewish community," St. Francis of Assisi Science, Religion and Peace Education Teacher Fred Whitaker, said.

"I convinced my parents, I said 'please, please let me go! It might help us in history!" Iroquois High School student and Pakistan native Mehwish Fnu said.

But apart from the excitement of getting to see a city outside of Louisville, Fnu, a Muslim, said the similarities between the Holocaust and the land she once called home are uncanny.

"Innocent people are dying every day in the wars in Syria and Jordan. People can't even go to school. And ISIS, it's like a dictatorship, you know, like Hitler," Fnu said.

They're all different people with different color skin, different types of clothing, different religions. But they all have one thing in common with the victims of the Holocaust: they're all human.

Whitaker has traveled to the Holocaust museum over 25 times and he's been The J's tour guide at the museum for more years than he can count. Most importantly, Whitaker said, he gets to help the students understand that while the events that defined the Holocaust may have ended in 1945, stereotyping did not.

"There are a lot of politics involved in understanding people's places in the world. Before you can understand people's places in the world, you must first get to know the people," Whitaker said. "I love that I get to help the kids see that."

The J selected 20 high school students to take the journey to the Holocaust museum. To be selected, each student had to submit an essay about why it would be important to visit the museum. The trip is funded by the Ida and Bernard Behr Fund, which is one of The J's Second Century Funds. For nearly 20 years the fund has made it possible to send over 400 students to the museum. That's over 400 students who have gotten to see a slice of history and connect it to the narrative of their lives.

Claus Behr said his grandparents died in concentration camps and he wanted to help create a fund that would honor their legacy and allow the youth to see it with their own eyes.

"We hope that by allowing these kids to see what the Holocaust was with their own eyes, that it will leave an impression on them. An impression they can bring back to tell their families and friends, and to one day, tell their own children," Behr said. "Because of this, that fund will always be there."

"You can't put bookends on the Holocaust. Understanding it is a way to comprehend the modern history of the Jewish people," Whitaker said. Perhaps it's the similarities to some of

Perhaps it's the similarities to some of the students' native countries that made the 2016 trip so different than years past. But for each student, the trip seemed to connect the dots, to intertwine lines and connect them with each other and to all humanity.
