An Open Letter to JCC Members: Facility Update

The JCC turns 125 in 2015, and we'll be celebrating together at events being planned for us. Our building turns 60 next year, and thanks in part to a grant from the Jewish Heritage Fund for Excellence (JHFE) some upgrades are already completed or underway, and more are being planned for us.

We, your fellow JCC members, were asked to help address some of the building areas that haven't yet been upgraded, but can be if we meet JHFE's latest challenge for us to contribute our share: raise \$120,000 and they'll match it. We decided since it's the JCC's 125th year, we'll shoot for \$125,000.



His wife, Dr. Jennifer Elster, is a pediatric oncologist, and "I want them to come up with some kind of breakthrough so my wife can be home more, he said, only partially joking. "Also, if – God forbid – one of my kids was diagnosed, I'd want that breakthrough for

Elster has been volunteering his time

Elster said that while he's been helping with fundraising efforts for years, he was never able to put a name and face to his efforts until he knew Glen.

Glen's Army organized a team to walk in this year's CureSearch Walk on September 13. Elster and Warnick were hoping to raise \$5,000 and have a team of about 35 people. Instead, 86 people participated in the walk, and they've raised nearly \$13,000 ... in just three

Though there were more than 10 teams on the walk, Glen's Army raised more than one-third of the walk's goal and was the top team. Glen was unable to attend because he was receiving treatment at the time, but some of his family members were there.

The group also hosted an event at the Comfy Cow ice cream shop in St. Matthews on September 8 to celebrate Glen's second birthday. The shop agreed to donate 20 percent of sales to their cause, and they brought in \$162. "We ate over \$800 worth of ice cream," Warnick said.

In awe of the amount of participation and money raised, Warnick said, "Magic happened.

Another way the group has raised funds is by selling T-shirts. They say,

"Glen's Army" on the front and "Glen is stronger than me" on the back. The group is planning to order another set of shirts soon.

CureSearch is the fundraising arm of the Children's Oncology Group, an international consortium that sets standards of treatment for pediatric malignancies, which helps ensure that all children who get cancer treatment receive the same standard of care no matter where they

Glen's Army only started three weeks ago, but has no plans to stop. "Next we're going to conquer St. Baldrick's," Elster

There are 42 children diagnosed with cancer every day, Elster said. And there are only two drugs approved to treat children's cancer, Warnick added. "We want them to get more options.'

Warnick is hoping to go to medical school next year and wants to specialize

'Glen is my superhero," she said.

Elster said that 30 years ago, if a child was diagnosed with Acute Lymphocytic Leukemia, he or she had about a 50/50 chance of survival. Now that is 97 percent, Elster said to illustrate the progress pediatric cancer has made.

"We parents live such busy lives, and for the most part, we just smile and wave vaguely at one another in passing," Elster said. "It's just so awe-inspiring to see what these pseudo-strangers have done as a community to make a stand against childhood cancer in support of Glen.'

Mike Kessler's dog Samantha, 4-year-old black Lab mix, preferred to run and jump from the side of the pool







CenterStage and J. Michael Spa and Salon present "Sweeney Todd, the Demon Barber of Fleet Street." The show will bring murder and mayhem to the stage, along with some singing, dancing and much laughter.

The 1979 musical is based on a 1973 play by Christopher Bond about a 19th century London barber who goes on a murderous rampage and the baker who helps him by baking his victims into pies. Written by Stephen Sondheim with libretto by Hugh Wheeler, CenterStage will present "Sweeney Todd" at the Jew-ish Community Center Oct. 23-Nov. 9.

The show has won Tony Awards for Best Musical, Best Musical Score and Best Producer. Since its debut in 1979, the show has had two revivals in 1989 and 2005, has had several staged concerts and was made into a movie starring Kentucky's own Johnny Depp.

CenterStage director John Leffert described the show as "a dark comedy and a satirical social commentary. While the show is for an adult audience, it won't be gory," he said. There will be no blood on the stage.

The CenterStage version will combine the revival version with a nod to the original play, Leffert said. The set will have an industrial, asylum-like feel designed by Karl Anderson, he added.
The role of Sweeney Todd is played by

Austin Lauer, who also wowed audiences as Melchior in "Spring Awakening."
"On a personal level, this is one of my bucket-list shows," Leffert said. "I'm re-

ally excited to be directing this show. It's brilliantly written, and is a director's and designer's dream to bring to life on the stage.

Judges this year were Fund for the Arts President Barbara Sexton Smith, former Miss Kentucky Whitney Trowbridge, professional musician Angie Hopperton, professional dancer and choreographer Zachary Boone and Kevin Bundrent from Heyman Talent agency. An audience vote made up 50 percent of the final round judging as well.

Latts co-hosted the final round with Leffert.
