## TRX Training System now available for all JCC Members for free


elping everyone take their workouts to the next level. The JCC is opening up TRX Suspension Training to all JCC Members

"TRX Suspension Training is a very different way for our members to get into shape," says Assistant Health and Wellness Director Tara Stone. "The system relies on a person's bodyweight for resistance, allowing you to control your workout."

To use the TRX straps, simply sign them out at the Health and Wellness Desk. A JCC Floor Staff member will help you set up and take down the straps. The system is only available when the Upper Gym is not already in use by another program.

Using a person's body weight and gravity, the TRX Suspension Trainer allows for hundreds of different exercises. Started by a former Navy SEAL to keep his teammates in shape while deployed in the field, TRX is designed to be easy and flexible. However, the workout can be intense

the TRX System on their own, we are hoping more people use this tool," says Fitness Director Ron Peacock. "It is a great workout, but many of our members are not as familiar with this type of exercise."

To help you get the most out of the TRX System, the JCC is offering personal and small group training sessions working with the TRX System. Working

out with a Personal Trainer individually or in a group can have a huge impact on your workouts or fitness level. Training classes will be held on Mondays starting on November 11 from noon-12:45 p.m. and Thursdays starting November 14 from 5:45-6:30 p.m. Classes cost \$72 per session. ## Les Misérables soars with optimism

In presenting *Les Misérables*, the contemporary musical adaptation of Victor Hugo's classic novel, John Leffert is catapulting CenterStage to new heights.

Not only is he presenting the regional premier of this epic tale, but he has recruited Simmons Falk from Actors Theatre of Louisville and Technical Director Patrick Jump to design and build the most elaborate and largest set in Center-Stage's history.

With three giant turntables, they expand the company's limited stage area and allow the set to transform quickly and easily from one scene to the next as Jean Valjean (Jeremy Moon) traverses France and makes his way in society.

Les Mis is the story of a man whose grinding poverty drove him to steal bread for his sister's family. When he was caught, he drew a long, harsh prison sentence imposed by a penal system that also branded him for life as an incorrigible convict. Released with papers

identifying him as a convict, Valjean is stripped of hope and steals again, only to be turned around by an act of kindness.

The story unfolds as Valjean seeks to build a new, honest life, always pursued by Inspector Javert (Josh Gilliam) who never lets him totally escape his past.

Has Valjean truly changed? Judge for yourself as you witness his treatment of Fantine (Jill Higgenbotham), Cosette (Lexie Stites and Madison Mclean as young Cosette and Margo Wooldridge as an older Cosette), and Marius (Jordan Price), Cosette's suitor.

The story interplays with the class struggles and upheavals that define 19th Century France. Leffert integrates a large cast to bring this story to life with the able assistance of the CenterStage orchestra.

Les Mis opened Thursday night and performances continue until November 10. Tickets, \$18 each, are selling quickly and several performances are already sold out.

## Somber performance of And Then They Came for Me brings Holocaust education to life

On Sunday, October 13, Acting Out, CenterStage's professional children's theater company, presented a public performance of *And Then They Came for Me: Remembering the World of Anne Frank* in the Jewish Community Center's auditorium. The audience included many students from the Louisville Hebrew School and the High School of Jewish Studies.

The play, by James Still, presents the story surrounding Anne Frank, her family and two childhood friends, Ed Silverberg and Eva Schloss. Part documentary and part theater, the play provides a window into this dark period of our history in a format designed to engage teens and adults.

Larry Singer as Ed Silverberg ties things together and provides perspective as the play takes the audience from a Hitler Youth gathering through Kristallnacht and into the throes of the Holocaust, often recounting events as things that happen to themselves, avoiding portrayals of the brutality and horror.

And Then They Came for Me succeeds in conveying the gravity and the scope of the events without overburdening its young audience. The entire cast should be commended.

Following the performance, Holocaust survivors John and Reneé Rothschild, who now call Louisville home, told of their personal ordeal. Theirs is a love story overlaid on the Nazi persecution. Reneé fled from Germany to France, only to be pursued and arrested by the Nazi collaborators in the Vichy government in 1942. She managed to get word to John, a Swiss citizen, and he succeeded in rescuing her.

The Rothschilds' full story was published in *Community* in April and is available on www.jewishlouisville.org.

There will be another public performance at the JCC on Sunday, December 15, at 12:30. The Acting Out company is also presenting *And Then They Came for Me* at schools across the region.
