The new Post-Rehab class, offered on Thursdays, September 4-18 at 9 a.m., will help people who've finished rehabilitation of common injuries but still need guidance returning to a solid exercise program. The class will teach participants how to safely progress safely back to a workable fitness routine and can be customized to any level of fitness and injury rehab. This class costs \$60 per member.

In Power Lifting 101, offered on Wednesdays September 3-24 at 5:30 p.m., class members will develop strength and lean muscle through heavy weight training. Chicago Heats Up CenterStage Sept. 4-20



CenterStage at the JCC and Hilliard Lyons present the Broadway hit musical *Chicago*, a titillating story of murder, greed and corruption, September 4-20,

in the Linker Auditorium.
Set in the Roaring 20's, the musical is based on a play of the same name by reporter Maurine Dallas Watkins. The original show features music, lyrics and a book by John Kander and Frank Ebb. It was first performed on Broadway in 1975, with a revival opening in 1996. The revival is the third longest running production in Broadway history and is still being performed today. The revival production has received six Tony Awards, two Olivier Awards for its London performance and a Grammy.

Chicago is the scandalous story of two rival vaudevillian murderesses, Roxie Hart and Velma Kelley, locked up in the Cook County Jail. With the help of prison matron Mama Morton and her slick lawyer, Billy Flynn, Velma attempts to turn her prison sentence into one big glitzy media frenzy. Roxie manages to steal Velma's front page headlines and her lawyer. Both women are eventually found innocent, but it's not long before another woman shoots up the courthouse stealing all the publicity.

The CenterStage production is a mix of both the original and the popular revival and it is CenterStage's most requested show.

"The show deals with subjects that

are still prevalent in society like reality stars, paparazzi and fame," said Artistic Director John Leffert.

The cast is sure to please as much as the racy costumes and dazzling score. Whitney Trowbridge, former Miss Kentucky and 4th Runner up Miss America, makes her CenterStage debut as Velma Kelley, delivering a seductive performance of "And All That Jazz." Kate E. Reedy returns to the stage as vixen Roxie Hart, having appeared in CenterSage classics including Rent and Ragtime. Pete Lay "razzle dazzles" the audience as lawyer Billy Flynn.

Chicago is the second of six plays in CenterStage's 100th anniversary season. CenterStage will also showcase Sweeney Todd, Beauty and the Beast, Once on this Island and Fiddler on the Roof.

Lenae Price, CenterStage Outreach director, said it's especially important this year as two grants for Acting Out weren't renewed.

For every \$500 raised, Acting Out can provide a school performance at a discount, which makes the performance much more affordable, she said.

"A lot of these schools, especially Tile 1 schools, have limited resources," she said.

Latts loves the performing arts, plays piano and has been in a number of plays at CenterStage and other theaters. His mission all along has been to help kids like him have opportunities to enjoy theatre, as he has.

Kate Latts, Jake's mom, said it's been a great opportunity for Jake to develop leadership skills and put into practice their family's philanthropic values.

"I'm proud of him," she said.

Jake Latts encouraged everyone who has a performing arts skill to come to the auditions Sept. 7 at the JCC. Whether it's music, dance, acting, comedy or something else, all acts are welcome.



The JCC is expanding its cultural arts classes this fall. Two new art instructors will be joining long-time teacher, Sue Huttenlocher, to provide additional options for art students. The JCC is also adding a new creative writing class.

Sharon Matisoff will teach a new Introduction to Soft Pastel class on Tuesdays, September 23-October 28 at 6:30

Matisoff is an award-winning artist who creates pastel and oil paintings in the realist tradition with an Impressionistic approach to color. The course is open to students of all levels. Each week, students will work to capture an arrangement with soft pastel. The class will discuss art, color theory and the special skills needed to work in pastel. Luci Mistratov from the Kentucky Watercolor Society will teach Watercolor for Beginners on Mondays, September 22-October 27 at 6:30 p.m.


