
## **Film Festival Returns with** Laughs, Drama and More

> he 17th annual Louisville Jewish Film Festival promises to make attendees laugh, cry, sing and think with a wide variety of op-







As part of the JCC's 125th Anniversary, the festival will team up with CenterStage to offer a special musical event -Broadway Musicals: A Jewish Legacy, on Saturday, February 7. The event will feature the Peabody Award-winning documentary looks at the unique role of some of the greatest composers, writers and performers of the Broadway stage.

The songs of the Broadway musical were created almost exclusively by Jewish Americans, such as Irving Berlin, Jerome Kern, George and Ira Gershwin, Leonard Bernstein, Richard Rogers and Oscar Hammerstein, John Kander, Harold Prince, Stephen Sondheim, Mel Brooks, Matthew Broderick, Zero Mostel, Nathan Lane, Idina Menzel, Kristin Chenoweth, Barbra Streisand and more over a 50 year period. There will be a catered dessert reception and complimentary beer and wine.

The Louisville Jewish Film Festival opens on February 5 with Run Boy Run, the true story of a 9-year old Polish boy who flees the Warsaw ghetto in 1942. Forced to survive in the woods while evading SS patrols and finding occasional shelter from locals, he is able to keep his Jewish faith alive.

Other highlights include Kidon (February 8, 2 p.m. at Village 8 Theater). This comedic spy-thriller begins with the killing of a Hamas leader in a Dubai hotel. Local police blame Mossad, who has never heard of the agents or their mission. Mossad must quickly figure out the situation as it realizes it is only one player in a high-stakes con game.

Gett: The Trial of Vivian Amsalem (February 16, 7 p.m. at the Temple) won the Israeli Film Academy Ophir Award for Best Picture in 2014 and is nominated for a Golden Globe and is Israel's nomination for best foreign film at the Academy Awards. It tells the story of an Israeli woman and her struggle to leave her loveless marriage. Her religiously devout husband is refusing a gett (divorce) which is required, as all mar-





riage and divorce in Israel is done with the blessing of Orthodox rabbis. Gett is a heart-rending portrait of a woman's struggle to overcome an unmoving patriarchy and live a life of her own design.

Zero Motivation (February 21, 7:30 p.m. at Village 8 Theaters), is a cynical comedy about the lives of three young women doing mandatory service in the Israeli Army. A huge hit in Israel, the film revolves around a unit of female Israeli soldiers, bored spending their days



CenterStage is set to bring a burst of spring to Louisville this February with the romantic fairy tale Once on This Island, an enchanting musical that will warm your hearts as it whisks you away to a tropical paradise.

From the Tony Award-winning song-writing team of Lynn Ahrens and Ste-phen Flaherty of Seussical and Ragtime, Once on This Island is a one-act musical about a peasant girl in the Caribbean who finds love in a world of prejudice and uses her love to change people and bring them together. Borrowing from Hans Christian Anderson's The Little Mermaid with some tragic elements of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, the familiar story is told in a refreshing, innovative way.

Ahrens responded instantly to the novel's poetic language and simple beauty and realized they had found their story. The show's journey began in 1990 Off-Broadway at Playwright's Horizon, but was quickly transferred to Broadway later that year, where it ran for 469 performances. The production was honored with eight Tony Award nominations including Best Musical. The West End production opened in 1994 running for 145 performances and winning the Olivier Award for Best New Musical.

Cierra Richmond as Ti Moune will lead the 23-member ensemble cast. Though you will remember her incredible voice from Little Shop of Horrors (Urchin) and RENT ("Seasons of Love" soloist) this marks her debut in a lead role at CenterStage. Also returning are Pat Mathison (Sophia/The Color Purple),

Tymika Prince (Celie/The Color Purple, Sarah/Ragtime) and Alonzo Richmond (Colehouse/Ragtime).

"Once on This Island is an absolutely captivating musical," CenterStage Artistic Director John Leffert said. "The Caribbean-style music is infectious, the script rich with poetic storytelling and the universal theme of love breaking down barriers of prejudice and stereotypes transcends generations making the piece perfect for the entire family. It is no accident that this show is being presented in February. Celebrate African American History Month and Valentine's Day with CenterStage as we celebrate love, acceptance, diversity and the chipping away of stereotypes and prejudice with our production of Once on This Island."

Once on This Island runs February 12-22. Tickets are \$20 in advance and \$22 at the door. Call 502-238-2709, or visit CenterStageJCC.org.





## **JCC Patio Gallery Welcomes Three Shows on Peace**

The JCC is featuring three inter-related shows in the Patio Gallery, the new Lobby Gallery, and the lobby, and there was an opening reception for all three on Sunday, January 11.

The Patio Gallery features the work of New York-based textile artist, Laurie Wohl who was in Louisville for the opening and gave a PowerPoint presentation explaining her work and techniques.

Wohl interweaves Muslim, Jewish, and Christian poetry and spiritual texts from the period of the Convivencia in Spain (the 8th-15th centuries) and from contemporary Middle Eastern poets, particularly Palestinian and Israeli. Her work emphasizes the striking parallels between Arabic and Hebrew texts, rich in poetry of spiritual love, of exile, of nostalgia for Andalusia and of enemies and reconciliation.

Her hope for the project is that its visual and auditory components will make obvious the connections between the Abrahamic religions and stimulate reflection on shared emotional, aesthetic and thematic content.

Wohl uses unwoven canvas, textured papers, and other materials embellished

with Arabic and Hebrew, as well as Greek and sh, calligrasome English, phy which, along with her own personal iconography, also references the iconography of the veil.

An audio component available on iPods consists of readings in English, Arabic, and Hebrew of the poems

contained in her work. The Arabic and Hebrew are then interwoven to create a soundscape" illustrating the commonality of the Middle Eastern languages.

On view in the new Lobby Gallery are photographs by Terry Taylor, outgoing executive director of the Interfaith Paths to Peace. These photographs are part of his show "A Pilgrim's Lens," which reflect Taylor's "sometimes sacred, sometimes secular spiritual journeys around the U.S. and the world.

Also in the lobby is a public art project called Peace Postcards, founded by Allan Weiss. The goal of this project is to encourage people to think about peace and what it means for the future of the
