

### JCC of Louisville Selected to Pilot PJ Our Way National Program

year ago, PJ Library and the Harold Grinspoon Foundation introduced PJ Our Way to 10 communities nationwide. With more than 3,000 subscribers, this new program for children ages 9 to 11, has successfully been bringing Jewish books into older children's lives as effectively as PJ Library has done with younger children over the last 10 years.

Louisville has been selected as one of only 24 cities worldwide to continue testing this exciting new program.

Building on the success of PJ Library, which gives the gift of Jewish children's books each month to more than 140,000 children, ages six months to eight years old, in North America, PJ Our Way allows program participants to select one of four books every month, giving them more choice on their journey toward being life-long readers while introducing them to Jewish ideas. PJ Our Way is open to all eligible children even if they

did not participate in PJ Library.

As part of the program, PJ Our Way participants can create book trailers, videos, quizzes, author interviews, and other media to communicate with peers about the books. A separate PJ Our Way website - www.pjourway.org -provides these new avenues for discussion.

We believe these stories and their values help shape young people in their understanding of being Jewish, and it's our hope that PJ Our Way will ultimately build a strong community of young Jewish people," said Harold Grinspoon, founder of PJ Library and PJ Our Way.

Many years of development went into this program. Catriella Freedman, director of PJ Our Way states, "we've thought a great deal about how to engage older readers by giving them more choice in what they read and then giving them creative platforms to talk to their peers about the books."

PJ Library Director Jennifer Tuvlin

states, "we are so fortunate that Louisville has been selected for this program. Jewish children in Louisville can now have access to age (and reading level) appropriate Jewish books to complement what they are already reading. Many of the books come from popular series that kids are already reading such as the "Who Was..." biography series with choices including biographies of famous Jews such as Harry Houdini.

PJ Our Way will have its kick off event in conjunction with the J Forty-Fivers on Friday, November 20 from 5:30 - 7:30 p.m. Together families will enjoy a Shabbat dinner at which time we will learn about PJ Our Way and register on site. Then, Bricks 4 Kids will be there to have a Lego extravaganza. Even if you cannot make the kick off event, you can register your child at www.pjourway.org.

# The World of Anne Frank Returns to CenterStage Acting Out

ee Anne Frank through the eyes of her friends and neighbors in the emotional theatre piece *And Then They Came for Me: Remembering the World of Anne Frank*, presented by CenterStage Acting Out.

Public performances are on Tuesday, November 10 at 6:30 p.m., and Sunday November 15 at 2 p.m. at the Jewish Community Center's Linker Auditorium.

The November 10 performance is also a special commemoration of Kristallnacht, or "The Night of Broken Glass."



From Nov. 9 to 10, 1938, on the streets of Germany, the Nazis terrorized and slaughtered Jews, shattered windows of Jewish-owned stores, lit synagogues on

fire and vandalized schools and homes.

It was a bloody, scorching and revelatory night for the Jews of Germany. There was no longer any question as to Hitler's intentions for them.

To honor and remember those who died and suffered on Kristallnacht, Adath Jeshurun's Cantor David Lipp will sing *Dachau Lied*, aka *Dachau Song*, written in 1938 by Dachau prisoners playwright Jura Soyfer and composer Herbert Zipper.

Kristallnacht survivors will also be in attendance, making the evening even more memorable and poignant.

"To do a piece about the Holocaust on that night with Kristallnacht survivors that lived it will be powerful," said CenterStage Artistic Director John Leffert.

Written by three-time Pulitzer Prize nominee James Still, And Then They Came for Me is part oral history, part dramatic action, part direct address and part remembrance. In this unique theatrical experience, actors use real interviews to tell the stories of the lives of three Jewish teenagers: Anne Frank, Ed Silverberg and Eva Geiringer (Schloss) during Nazi Germany's Holocaust. Ed was Anne Frank's first boyfriend, and she wrote about him in the beginning of her now-famous diary. Eva was the same age as Anne Frank and lived in the same apartment building in Amsterdam. Her family went into hiding the same day as the Frank family. And like the Frank family, they were betrayed. On Eva's 15th birthday, her family was



arrested by Nazis and sent to concentration camps. Eva and her mother survived, and after the war her mother married Otto Frank (Anne's father).







# Two Artists Bring Unique Works to JCC Patio Gallery

#### **Martin Rollins**

The subjects of the paintings in Martin Rollins' Patio Gallery show "This, That and the Other," may have no obvious connection, but the vibrant and eclectic body of work does have a common thread.

"The artworks were created from 1980-2015 and all use a related format of still-life objects paired with an image or images," said Rollins. "My goal in grouping them was to see the relationship between the different artworks as well as the range of how I've used the format over time."

Rollins, a popular Louisville-based artist known for his lush landscapes and depictions of River City neighborhoods, shows a different side of his painting persona in "This, That and the Other," which is on display through Tuesday, November 17.

Curious couplings are a recurring theme. For instance, in "Lincoln Pears," Rollins pairs the legendary president with produce.

"I used the pears for their 'human' qualities: their flesh, their skins freckled and pied, their vulnerability, and their forms," Rollins said. "They were not necessarily intended as stand-ins for humans, but I suppose to some degree they are."

As Rollins was creating the painting, he "was ruminating on Lincoln and his humanity, as well as the trajectory of his life in the presidency. He was so brilliant and yet so enigmatic; the deep personal costs he paid to save the country at that crucial juncture," Rollins said. "Depicting him with pears doesn't say all of that but these were my thoughts as I drew the image."


Other peculiar combinations within the works include Jackie O. and a conch shell, and peaches with an Impressionist-style ballet dancer.

This show allowed Rollins a chance to reconsider and rediscover his work.

"It allowed me to bring a number of these works together for the first time, and to experience connections and relationships between them," he said. "As an artist, seeing the works together in this way can not only give you new insights into the individual artworks, but they may also suggest other creative paths up ahead."

#### Tim McCoy

Georgia-based photographer, philosopher and poet Tim McCoy used a fascinating vintage process to create the eight peaceful gold-toned prints in "Long, Long Journey to the Sea," on dis-

play in the JCC's Patio Showcase though Sunday, November. 8.

To bring his images of gorgeous locales including Tennessee's Smoky Mountains, Georgia's Suwanee River and a North Carolina Cherokee reservation to shadowy, impeccably detailed life, McCoy used silver nitrate and albumen, a protein found in egg whites.

"I take the egg whites, separate them from the yolks, and I beat them with chemicals until it becomes a very stiff meringue," he said. "Then I let that sit over night and in the morning, out from that meringue comes this beautiful golden material, and that's albumen."

McCoy then transfers the albumen into a tray and floats raw paper on it. After the paper is coated with albumen, he hangs it up to dry, and then floats it on a silver nitrate solution.

The albumen and nitrate-coated paper is then put in contact with a negative and vacuum-sealed in the frame.

McCoy said the process, which gives the images their dramatic contrast, was the chief way of developing photos in the latter half of the 19th century. He likes how the method imbues his images with an old-fashioned feeling.

"It refers to the past, just by its process," he said. "When people look at these images, there's already something that forces you to look backward."

As for the deeper meaning of the watery works, McCoy, who follows Buddhist and Taoist teaching, said he is encouraging viewers to reflect on the flow of life through the natural journey of water from mountain source to sea.

The JCC Patio Gallery is free and open to the public Sunday 9 a.m.-6 p.m., Monday-Thursday 8:30 a.m.-9 p.m. and Friday 8:30 a.m.-7 p.m.
