A Letter from Leadership

Dear Chaverim (friends),

In 1832, a small group of Jewish immigrants created the first Jewish institution in Louisville, a Jewish benevolent society; planting an important seed in the hopes that it would grow into a flourishing community. Year after year, new generations embraced that dream. As generation after generation embraced L'dor v'dor, Jewish Louisvillians built, grew, and improved the lives of those around them. Throughout it all, we remained committed to both being a part of our city and to creating a vibrant Jewish community. As a result of that commitment, the tiny seed planted so many years ago has blossomed into a vibrant and robust tree.

The results are evident all around us. We spent our first year in the Trager Family JCC surrounded by joy and energy in our Camp J, reading books in our PJ Library nook, celebrating Shabbat with our Early Learning Center (ELC) children in the Weisberg Family Lobby each week, sharing our stories in the Shapira Foundation Auditorium and supporting our seniors in our Kohn Family Town Square. So many elements of our community come together here. And every aspect of this belongs to all of us, members, guests, donors and the community at large. Together we are fulfilling a vision of a Jewish future built upon the foundations of today.

Several years ago, we identified four core Jewish values to incorporate in everything we do. These Jewish values are the touchstones of the Jewish Community of Louisville (JCL), the Jewish Federation and the Trager Family JCC. They are in every part of the future that we are building and they live each day in our work.

Torah תורה

We are constantly learning and growing together, as individuals and as a community - whether it's through our pre-school ELC programs, our summer and year-long camps, our programming with CenterStage and the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC), our Louisville Jewish Film Festival or our senior educational opportunities, we learn Jewish values and principles and share them broadly. This past year, all on the same stage, we elevated the Black experience through The Sankofa Experience, highlighted ethical philanthropy as part of our Three Pillars series, and gathered a packed crowd to commemorate together the tragedy of the Shoah. Opportunities to learn together like these, matter. Torah, the teachings and foundations we have been gifted, remains a constant as we learn, teach and grow together.

It is our responsibility as a community to take steps to make our world better. Whether we are speaking to school children through our JCRC about combatting antisemitism and other forms of hate or partnering with faith organizations around our city to welcome each other and work shoulder to shoulder, we will continue to take action when action is needed and provide a voice for all communities.

We know that there are so many in our community who are in need and who are our most vulnerable. The 2021-2022 Study of Jewish Louisville identified many of these needs, including loneliness, financial instability and food/housing insecurity among individuals and families in Louisville. Whether it's the refugee children who we welcome to Camp J, or an isolated individual we provide a warm lunch to through our Meals on Wheels program, we act.






STACY MARKS NISENBAUM AWARD: Violeta Higuera and Maraya Goldstein


